#### Where does the pollution from the plant go?

Dr. Kincaid: The concern I have is that if we want to know the long-term effect of the pollution plume, we always want the residual flow. There was no work that I saw in the permit application that refers to residual flow.

# Do we really know where the pollution will go in Chandler Bay and will it dissipate?

Dr. Kincaid: I would say based on the level of data available, it's not possible to say how far the pollution will go and how much negative impacts it will have. I just don't think there is enough information to make an informed decision.

## **Economic Concerns**

After reviewing the economic report touted by Kingfish, this was the takeaway from Dr. Black:

- This report had significant shortcomings for both jobs and employment potential.
- The report used numbers that were inflated because the report didn't use specific Jonesport numbers.
- A large industrial facility can impact housing values negatively & erode the tax base.
- If this facility decimates the lobster industry, you are looking at a loss.
- This facility in Maine is part of a larger global business that is going to be paying CEO's that are outside of Maine, Jonesport, and Washington County.
